HEADTEACHER'S NEWS

School celebrates a highly successful Ofsted inspection:

I am sure parents, students, staff and governors will be delighted to read our 2014 Ofsted report. In a climate of higher expectations, and with the bar raising year by year, it has become increasingly challenging to secure a grading of Good. I am delighted to confirm we have achieved this yet again, the fourth consecutive inspection in which our grading has held up. It means - officially - the school has been a good school, continuously, for more than a decade. A copy of the report can be found at the back of the newsletter, and there will be a link to it on our website. In summary, the inspection team found that:

This is a good school

- Students achieve well. They make good progress in almost all subjects including mathematics and especially English and litera-CY.
- Teaching is mostly good and sometimes outstanding.
- Students behave well because expectations of them are clear and they receive good care and support.
- Students feel very safe and the school's promotion of spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is highly effective.
- This school is a harmonious community with strong relationships between students and staff.
- The headteacher and senior leaders provide very effective leadership that has contributed substantially to improvements. They have a clear plan for success and the sense of purpose is shared across the school.

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Press Release for Amesbury First Consultation – January 2014

The Amesbury Shadow Community Operations Board (Shadow COB) are consulting with local residents on the proposal for a campus in the Amesbury Community Area.

Lots of different communities live in the Amesbury Community Area and the Shadow COB wants to gather everyone's views on what they want and need from a campus for the Amesbury area.

The idea behind a campus is to bring together a number of services and facilities together into one building or a series of building. This means that people can access services from the council community services and partners including the police. These campuses could be new buildings or greatly-improved and developed existing buildings. The aim is to make maximum and efficient use of the council's buildings – both new and existing – and create campuses that deliver more for local communities.

Community campuses will be developed through input from local people ensuring each campus is as individual as the community it serves. This consultation is an essential part of the process to ensure the services included in a campus are what people across the whole community feel are needed now and for future generations.

Paper copies of the survey are available through the libraries, in local community shops, at town and parish council offices. They are also being sent to homes through the Stonehenge Trader. Members of the Shadow COB will be attending local meetings and events in order to talk about the consultation and speak to local people directly.

The consultation period will run from January to March. This is only the first step in a long process, but it is a very important one because it will start to shape what the campus will offer.

There will be a further round of consultation later in the year. The proposal will then go to Wiltshire Council's cabinet for approval.

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Stonehenge actors make the grade again!

Another 22 of our students were successful in achieving Graded Acting Awards from The London Academy of Music and Dramatic Arts. These ranged from Grade 4 to the highest possible Grade 8 Gold Medals.

In October and December, students performed contrasting scenes (three for Gold and two for other grades) and answered questions in these, the most valued and respected of performance examinations.

This year we also launched the Reading for Performance Awards and our own Librarian, Mrs Gane set the standard with a top Grade 8 for her performance of three of Kipling's writings. Gold Acting medals (with merits) were awarded to Robben Sherburne, Hollie Sherburne, Nathan Carter, Euan Mauchline, Fraser Adams, Montana Birks and Lauren Peachment also bagged a Gold. All presented both challenging and dynamic pieces, ranging from Robben's highly moving 'Oedipus The King' to Nathan's Rimmer from 'Red Dwarf'. Holly Sherburne also demonstrated her truly amazing range and knowledge with her roles. Fraser Adams once again teamed up with Euan Mauchline with their sinister and tense duologue from 'Sleuth', highly entertaining. Lauren Peachment's 'Crazy' monologue brought a lump to the throat and Montana Birks, yet again showed her sheer depth and versatility.

Bronze Medals went to Alice Zowah, Lauren Kenny and Leah Yates (merit). All three exploring the full depth of emotional states.

Grade 5 certificates are the highest pre- Medal awards. Laura Evans, Millie Howden and Grace Meadow earned merits for their excellent performances. Darcy Baker Watts, Tom Brown, Megan Ingram, Roane Manning and Lucy Hackett impressed with their well crafted acting.

Amazingly (and equally impressively), Kaitlyn Bullard and Phoebe Taylor (merit), only three months into Year 7, have been awarded Grade 4 certificates. This really says a lot about the standards these students set for themselves.

Last year, famous actor Benedict Cumberbatch, in response to my request, wrote a letter of encouragement and advice to our LAMDA students here at The Stonehenge School. His ideas and recommendations have been enormously helpful to us in our preparations for the fantastically enjoyable challenges that LAMDA awards bring. We thank him and invite you to join in.

Year 9 were focused throughout the day and gave some great presentations.





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<u>Wiltshire Air Ambulance Charitable Trust are getting a new</u> <u>helicopter. Thanks for your support!</u>

From December this year, 2014, the helicopter everyone will see in the sky is the Bell 429. It's faster, it's bigger and the Charity are confident it will be providing Wiltshire with one of the best emergency aircraft available in the world. It's one of the world's newest and most advanced light twin-engine helicopter in service, equipped with the latest in flight technology. Prior to delivery the aircraft will be fitted out with the most recent Aerolite equipment to meet the highest helicopter emergency medical service (HEMS) specification.

The Wiltshire helicopter will be the first Bell 429 to operate as an air ambulance in the UK. It has a top speed of 150 knots and a range of 400 miles making rapid response to any incident within the county achievable within minutes.

'With the loss of our collaboration with the police we will need to fund the full cost of providing the air ambulance alone. However I can say with confidence that thanks to the passionate support the charity receives from so many people in Wiltshire, the necessary funds, about £2.5m annually, will be found"

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VIRTUAL BABIES

On Wednesday 22nd January the Reverend Jo Naish came into Mrs Iselin's year 10 BTEC Health and Social Care class. The Reverend is part of a team from the Mother's Union group in the area. She came to launch a project the group have started this term as part of their course. The course is about the care that is needed when planning to have a baby, through pregnancy and then the care a baby needs when it is new born.

Each of the students will have the opportunity to have a virtual baby to look after for a weekend. A virtual baby is a computerised doll that is programmed to react just as a baby might and the students have to respond to their baby's needs. They become active at 5pm on the Friday evening and then finish on the Monday morning. The students' responses are recorded and they get feedback in the week about how well they did as a parent.

As well as looking at the care side of women and babies the aim of the project is also to make the pupils aware how demanding a baby can be and appreciate










Staff Book Club
