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# SPRING ACTING SUCCESS!

Our first Spring LAMDA Acting examinations (Our bulk of entries are generally for the Winter examinations), meant more recognition for our budding actors.

Laura Evans and Grace Meadow achieved Silver Medals with three stunning performances that showed their true range as actors. Their scene from 'Sherlock' was full of suspense and provided contrasting tones with scenes from Dickens and Shakespeare. Both students already hold Grade 5 certificates.



Leah Yates was awarded a Silver for her three pieces- Alison in 'Look Back In Anger', attracted particular praise. Her control and contrasting vocal styles were praised highly. Leah already holds a Bronze Medal.

Roanne Manning was successful in gaining a Bronze Medal (with Merit) for his sensitive and moving performances, Oedipus being a particular challenge even for professional actors.

**Rebecca Lewis and Laura Stapleton's** Grade 5's (with Merits) impressed with a witty scene from 'Miranda' and a clever Jane Austin duologue.

Harry Webb bagged himself a Gold Medal for three powerful and contrasting performances from Sophocles, Dickens and Willy Russell.

Since 2010, 87 students have gained LAMDA Performance awards, including 17 Gold Medals, 25 Bronzes and 5 Silvers. Although most awards are for Acting, our Librarian, Miss Gane, achieved a Grade 8 Gold for Reading for Performance.

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# Terri Gough winning streak continues during the summer term 2015!

Terri Gough (7JRF) has competed in a number of Judo competitions since Easter and we are pleased to celebrate her success with her. Terri trains at Pinewood Judo Club three times a week, meaning a long day for her on a Monday, Tuesday and Thursday as she travels there after school.

With so many competitions throughout the year there is never chance for Terri to rest. Over Easter weekend she competed at the Meadowbank stadium in Edinburgh at the **Sportif International Judo Tournament**. Terri made a lot of progress in the months leading up to this competition which made it one of her best competitions to date. All her hard work and commitment in training helped her come away with a silver medal in the under 48kg weight category.



On Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> April took part in her next competition which was the **Northern Ireland Open competition**, in Belfast. Once again her training paid off when she became the Northern Ireland Open Champion winning in the girls under 48kg class. Terri was in blistering form winning all her 6 fights with maximum 10 point scores. Afterwards Terri said "I was nervous but I was feeling really good and I knew if I didn't make any mistakes I could take the title!

From Belfast to Cardiff, Terri's next competition was the Welsh Open Judo Tournament on Saturday in Cardiff on  $9^{th}$  May. Terri entered 2 different competition, the under 13 under 48kg and the Pre-Cadet (age 13 and 14

yr) under 48KG. Although competing in 2 competitions in one day Terri still achieved silver medals in both Competitions. She left the competition very happy with her

performance.

On 27<sup>th</sup> June Terri was supposed to compete in her first European competition in Belgium, however due to problems at the port of Calais her club decided to cancel the trip. So the weekend started with mixed feelings, however Terri's coach was able to get her into the **Kent International** in Gillingham. Although only 11 she competed in an under 16 and under 48kg event. Terri's disappointment of not going to Belgium soon disappeared when she won another Gold medal for this competition.



Terri is still eager and hungry for her judo and we all at Stonehenge hope to be able to continue to share in her success next year.

Well done to Terri for everything she has achieved this year and good luck for next year.

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# New assault course inspired by Ninja Warrior



We wanted to give our students an area to develop themselves physically in an outdoor environment. We originally had outdoor gym equipment in mind but after discussions and inspiration from the TV show Ninja Warrior, we decided to give our students something more exciting.

We worked closely with Pentagon Sport (a school playground company) to develop an eye-catching assault course aimed at our KS3 students (11-14). Using Pentagon's expertise, we managed to create a course that not only offered our students a place to develop themselves physically but also offered them a place to socialise by competing against each other as well as experiencing elements of teamwork.

We gave the students obstacles such as balancing beams, log climbers and

monkey bars to create a gruelling course to keep

the children active in a fun and engaging way.

After being inspired by Ninja Warrior, we decided to hold our own Ninja Warrior event to launch our new assault course. Pupils in years 7, 8 and 9 took part in heats during their PE lessons to see who could complete the new assault course in the quickest time.

The top three boys and girls of each year group went through to the grand final and the winner received a brand new PE kit supplied by our kit manufacturer Akuma. Year 9 student Finley Lloyd Gilmour won the contest with a record competition time of one minute and two seconds - Huge congratulations!!



The day was a huge success and since the launch, the assault course has been used regularly at break and lunchtimes as well as before and after school by students in all year groups.

We'd like to thank <u>Pentagon Sport</u> for sharing our ethos, they were efficient and managed the installation of the equipment excellently. Now the children have a new challenge; who can beat the record set by Finley Lloyd Gilmour... watch this space!

- Reporting facilities to help decrease wastage and improve the overall efficiency of the meal service


We will keep you informed of the development of this system and provide further information and guidance in early September.

The top 40% of students nationally receive a gold, silver or bronze certificate in the ratio 1:2:3 and each institution receives a Best in School certificate.




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# GCSE Textiles trip to the Victoria and Albert Museum

On Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> June, Mrs Hillier's yr 10 Textiles group ventured into London to visit the Alexander McQueen Savage Beauty Exhibition. Alexander McQueen was a prolific yet troubled fashion designer whose collections made headlines up until his untimely death in 2010. The exhibition was presented over several rooms, each with an individual theme from Jack the Ripper to American Football meets Orientalism. It presented the students with the opportunity to view haute couture designs up close and appreciate the craftsmanship, detail and creativity that elevates such designs to works of

art. There were also works by McQueen's collaborators, milliner Phillip Treacy and jeweller Shaun Leane. We saw highly original uses of natural materials such as shells, horn, animal skins and hair in the creations as well as incredibly lavish use of luxury fabrics and beaded decoration. It was a lovely day out and now that they are inspired, I can't wait to see what the class come up with for their final GCSE work! 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







