Farewell to Everyone from Mr Greeves

I initially joined the Stonehenge School in November 2011 for a temporary 6-week contract. I still remember the day of the interview in graphic detail, as well as all my thoughts at the time. My wife was pregnant, Christmas was coming and I wanted a challenge.

While driving through the main gate for the first time, I couldn't help but notice a large sign on the lower school building, which read "ST_NEH_NGE SCH__L". Letters were either missing or hanging loose at an angle. I felt like I had driven onto a St Trinian's movie set! I was quickly met by the Deputy Head Mrs Kerr and introduced to the Headmaster Mr Roper and the Head of Mathematics Mrs Edmunds. Everyone was very polite and professional.

I had to make a short presentation on how I could help improve the school. This was followed by teaching algebra to a Year 9 class whom I had never met before. Like anyone coming for a job interview I was quite nervous and wanted to impress. Informed that they were looking for someone who could motivate and engage students well, I felt like they had certainly invited the right candidate! I could also see that the students were all charming individuals. Anyway, after working for six weeks at the school, I was asked to stay on as a permanent member of staff. Unfortunately I had already signed a contract to teach at another school. So, I completed that obligation and the following September I raced back - without delay.

I would like to emphasise that my first impressions of the Stonehenge School could not have been more wrong; it was not like St Trinian's at all. Of all the schools where I have taught across Wiltshire, Somerset, Bristol, South Gloucester and Swindon, I have never felt such a deep attachment as I have here. Every member of staff has been very warm, every student has such energy and there is a sense of belonging, as if the school was one large family. That is the Stonehenge School that I know and love.

Over the last three years I have seen the school develop and improve, proudly becoming a Good School following last year's OFSTED inspection. (Thankfully the faulty sign had been quickly fixed a long time before!) I recall joyous times helping out with (ironically) the St Trinian's school play and dressing up in crazy clothes on those wonderful charity MUFTI days. Every child who I have taught has made a strong positive imprint on my memory; and it brings me great pleasure knowing how well every individual is growing up, with good learning, strong character and maturity. It is also wonderful to see how GCSE results have been improving every year.

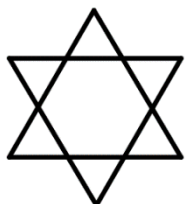

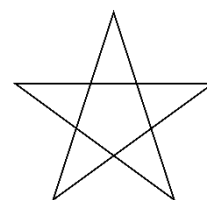
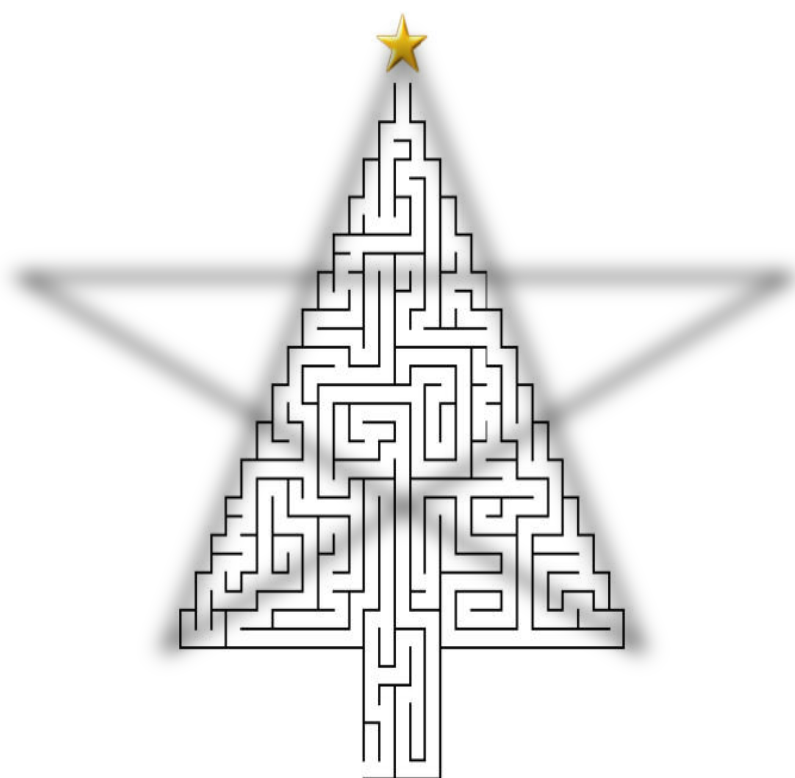
The Christmas Star

During his first year he concentrated on learning to race at club level and joined the largest MCF club in the UK (Ringwood) as it is popular and has a very competitive youth series.

Throughout 2014 Tom's results steadily improved to the point where he was competing for podiums in a full field of forty 85's many of which were been ridden by individuals who had been racing for several seasons. Tom was also given a wild card for the MCF National Grand Slam where he just missed out on a top ten finish behind a number of national champions.

In September 2014 Tom was accepted into the Richard Mike Jones MX academy and will attend coaching sessions in the UK and France throughout the winter in preparation for a very full 2015 season.

In November Tom was signed by Huskysport of Cheriton to ride their Husqvarna TC85 Big Wheel in both regional and British Youth National Championships in 2015.
