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#### HEADTEACHER'S NEWS

#### Record breaking GCSE results

I am delighted to report that our 2015 GCSE results are the best ever achieved in the 58 year history of the school. The national benchmark of 5 or more GCSE passes at higher grades (A\* to C), including English and Mathematics, was achieved by 61% of students. This surpasses the previous



record set in 2013. Our progress measures in English and Mathematics exceed the national average, with three quarters making three levels of progress and more than a third of students in both subjects making four. The majority of subjects met, or exceeded, their challenging targets for GCSE achievement and 10 students achieved A\* and A grades in almost all their subjects. Particularly outstanding individual performances included Euan Mauchline with 6 A\* and 4 A grades, Corrina Begley (5 A\* and 5 A), Annabel Fewing and Holly Sherburne (each with 4 A\* and 5 A), Montana Birks (3 A\* and 5 A), Gemma Hammond and Steven Hawkins (each 3 A\* and 5 A), Lauren Peachment (3 A\* and 4 A) and Dan Collins and Aaron Markham (each with 2 A\* and 6 A). Many congratulations to the students of 2015 and to the hard working and dedicated teachers

whose excellent teaching enabled our students to reach their potential.




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#### UNIFORM CONSULTATION

Registration for Biometrics took place on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> October, catch-up sessions will be held at the end of lunchtimes week commencing 2<sup>nd</sup> November

The Live date for the new Cashless System is 9th November

Further to our announcement last term, we are pleased to inform you that the school will be installing a cashless catering system which will be going live on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> November.

You have been sent a form to complete and sign confirming whether you wish your child to utilise the Biometric cashless system and information about the system. Children with consent were registered on Thursday  $15^{th}$  October. We will be holding catch-up sessions at the end of lunch times the week commencing  $2^{nd}$  November. It is essential that we have your written authority. We cannot register your child without consent.

This system incorporates the latest technology and eliminates the need for pupils to carry cash throughout the day thus reducing the risk of bullying. We will commence operating the system on  $9^{th}$  November and as such no cash will be accepted at the till points from this date.

Money can be paid into a pupil's account via ParentPay or Paypoint and any money spent on food and drink will be deducted on a daily basis. You can add between £3 and £50 to your ParentPay school meal account. We will have a daily spend limit of £5 programmed into the system.

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#### YEAR 11 NEWS

The first term always set the scene for the academic year and I have been particularly impressed with how focused Year 11 have been and what a great start they have made to the year.

Year 11 is a short and intensive year and deadlines come thick and fast, before you know it, it will be leaver's day. It is therefore imperative that your attendance at school is the best that it can be.

To emphasis this point I would like to remind you that the English Language exam is on the 4<sup>th</sup> November, the Wednesday after we return from half term. It is vital that students are fully prepared for this exam and Mr Wooster, The Head of English has given some advice and guidance below;

#### Preparation for English Language

The majority of Year 11 students will be sitting their English Language exam on the 4<sup>th</sup> of November, two days after we return from the half-term holiday. As a result, it's vital that you do some work on your own over the holiday to keep the exam skills you have learnt fresh in your mind. Your teacher will provide exam questions for you, but you can also make your own resources:

Take a newspaper article and highlight the facts in it. Summarise those facts in your own words. Look for effective words and phrases in non-fiction texts; work out the effect they are having on the reader, and write it down.

Re-write a newspaper article from a different point of view; turn a report into an interview, or vice versa.


You should be reading a variety of non-fiction texts over the holiday, and whatever you read, think about the audience and the purpose.

I would like to remind students that they must be in the Lower School Dining Hall by 8.30 a.m. on the morning of exams, in the correct uniform and with the correct equipment. Students should also view the seating plan as they enter the LSDH so that they know where to line up.

Very shortly you will start to apply for the next stage of your education and for the first time you will have major say in where you will go and what you will study. We have already had Wellington Academy and Wiltshire College into school to hold assemblies to advertise the course and facilities that they have to offer. Each provider is very different and I would encourage you to attend as many open days as possible. Only by visiting them will you get a true feeling of what they are like and whether you feel that you would fit in there.

Enjoy a relaxing break over half term but please take on board Mr Wooster's advice and make sure that you are fully prepared for the English exam on the  $4^{th}$  November.


Their aim was to raise money for Cancer Research UK after a good family friend of Louis's passed away recently.

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## Lord of the Flies, the Mayflower theatre, Southampton, September 30th



Having enriched my students' lives with To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee and The Crucible by Arthur Miller in Year 8; I thought they needed a gentler introduction to humanity in Year 9, so, this year we have been slowly descending in barbarity with William Golding's Lord of the Flies. As an encouragement to engage fully with the novel's dark themes, I offered the students a chance to see The West End production of The Lord of the Flies at the Mayflower theatre, Southampton.

The photograph above demonstrates the ingenious staging; the wrecked plane with its torn off wing, its naked fuselage, the tail fins and strewn luggage were all used by the actors to represent different parts of the island; fire even sprung from the broken wing with the help of Piggy's glasses!

The acting was exceptional; in particular the actor who played Jack, the twitchy, insecure, would-be dictator, was magnetic and frightening in his embrace of violence and power. The use of slow-motion and strobe lighting to represent Simon's epilepsy and a sense of prediction of the terrible events to come; was remarked upon as effective by my students.

Lights up and the students came out, excited and transformed by the power of theatre; they have a taste for it now; their main question - What will you take us to next, Sir?

The evening entertainment involved a trip to a snail farm, where we learned all about how snails are bred and cared for.


On Sunday we travelled into central Paris, past the pea and cloud factories, and scaled the heights of





Montmartre with panoramic views of the city. We made a quick stop at Notre Dame Cathedral and Brooke did a great job as our tour guide and we stopped for lunch at the foot of the Eiffel Tower. The afternoon involved a boat trip and walk up to Sacre Coeur, the sun only shone for about 20 minutes that day, but it was the 20 minutes we were making our way up the stairs so there were a few water and sun tan lotion stops. In the evening pupils were able to sample snails with mixed results, some loved them, others didn't quite manage it!

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On our final day - DISNEYLAND! Miss Pavey and Mr Young led the excitement stakes on Monday, we arrived at around 10am and made our way through the Mickey Mouse gardens into Disneyland, pupils were given maps and a lunch slot to check in with staff and off they went, sadly Thunder Mountain was closed but everything else was open and the first few hours in the park were queue free. Most pupils had returned to the staff check in point by 5pm for the parade, there were more mouse ears and ice cream than I have ever seen before.
