



Philosophy/ Religious Studies

This document outlines some of the main career options that the study of Philosophy or Religious Studies may lead to.

Both subjects teach you how to think for yourself and how to analyse and communicate ideas clearly and logically providing useful transferable skills for a range of future roles.

Each page contains details about the job, the qualifications required, and useful links that students and parents can follow.

Remember, these are just some suggestions- not an exhaustive list.

Chaplain

Qualifications Required

- Normally you will be expected to hold degree in theology or religious studies. Often chaplains will be ordained as a priest within the Christian faith. There are exceptions and roles are increasingly being opened up to people who have relevant experience.
- A number of postgraduate programmes are available to train as a chaplain including non-Christian based courses.

Details about the job

- Starting salaries = £22,500 to £25,000.
- After five years of experience you can expect to earn around £30,000,
- As a senior chaplain (sometimes known as co-ordinating chaplain), you can expect to be earning between £31,000 and £38,000.
- Chaplains in the Armed Forces earn around £38,000 a year,





Community development worker

Qualifications Required

- To work as a community development worker you should ideally hold a degree or HND. A qualification in a social sciences subject may improve your chances.
- Entry without a degree or HND is possible, although career development is more restricted.

Details about the job

You will help communities to bring about social change and improve the quality of life in their local area. You might work with individuals, families or whole communities.



- ensuring that local people have their say
- raising and managing funds
- developing and implementing strategies

- Starting salaries fall between £15,500 and £26,000.
- Salaries for those with two or more years' experience can reach £21,000 to £36,000.





Religious Studies Teacher (Secondary)

Qualifications Required

To qualify to teach Religious
Studies in the UK you will need to
gain a level 4 or above in Maths
and English. You will hold a
degree, preferably in Religious
Studies or Theology. You will then
have to study on a PGCE course.
You must also pass a Literacy and
Numeracy professional skills test
to begin teaching.

Details about the job

As a Religious Studies teacher you will deliver the Locally Agreed Syllabus to 11-16 year olds within the classroom.

You may also be expected to contribute to collective worship but this is variable.

Your subject knowledge will have to be excellent as you will be expected to teach GCSE Level.

Salary

Teachers pay is determined by their experience and responsibilities. The teacher pay scale can be found here:

Police officer

Qualifications Required

- You don't need a degree to become a police officer and the role is open to graduates and non-graduates.
- There are three new routes available to become a police officer:
- Apprenticeship (PCDA)
- Degree holder entry
- Pre-joining degree

Details about the job

As a police officer you'll work in partnership with the communities you serve to maintain law and order.

You will protect members of the public and their property.

You will prevent crime and reduce the fear of crime thereby improving the quality of life for all citizens.

Salary

Starting salary for police constables is between £20,880 and £24,177, rising to £40,128 at the top of the scale.

The range of salaries for sergeants is £41,500 to £45,098

Inspectors can earn between £51,414 and £55,768 rising to between £56,909 and £59,249 for chief inspectors

Police officers in London and the south of England receive additional pay allowances of up to £6,735.







Youth Worker

Qualifications Required

The minimum qualification required to work as a professional youth worker is a BA Hons validated by the National Youth Agency (NYA).

Professional training is also available at postgraduate level for those with a degree in a subject other than youth work.

Details about the job

You will guide and support young people in their personal, social and educational development to help them reach their full potential in society.

You'll generally work with young people aged between 11 and 25 in a variety of settings, such as:


Colleges

Faith-based groups

Schools

Youth centres.

- Youth support workers can expect to earn between £15,807 and £26,929.
- Professional youth workers have a recommended range of £23,679 to £39,961.
- Salaries for local authority youth service managers vary according to the size of the authority and responsibility of the post, but are usually in excess of £37,000.





Policy officer



Qualifications Required

- An undergraduate degree is usually required
- A degree in one of the following may help:
- public administration and social policy
- economics
- anthropology
- philosophy
- politics and internal relations

Details about the job



 Depending on your role, you may also be involved in campaigning for change.

- Starting salaries for policy assistant or officer roles range from £22,000 to £30,000.
- Senior policy advisors can earn between £32,000 and £40,000.
- Progressing to the role of policy manager, you could earn a salary of £40,000 to £50,000 or more.





Charity fundraiser


Qualifications Required

Relevant skills and experience will almost certainly be an essential requirement and many employers consider this to be more important than your subject of study. You can gain experience through volunteering or working as a fundraising assistant. It's crucial to take every available opportunity as charity fundraising is a popular and competitive area to break into.

Details about the job

As a charity fundraiser, you will aim to increase the contributions of individuals and groups by building relationships and exploring new fundraising opportunities from various sources.

- Starting salaries for a charity fundraiser can be anywhere between £15,000 and £22,000.
- As you rise to a more senior position you could be earning £25,000 to £40,000.
- At director level you could be earning in the region of £60,000, sometimes more.







Newspaper journalist



Qualifications Required

- Journalism is open to graduates of any discipline but an undergraduate degree in journalism or English may improve your chances.
- Some editors may be more interested in graduates with a specialist degree subject.
- Experience and personal qualities are also considered extremely important.

Details about the job



- They also cover national and local events, entertainment and human interest stories.
- There are a number of roles within newspaper journalism.

- The average income for a newspaper journalist is £27,500.
- As a trainee reporter, your salary could be as low as £12,000 to £15,000
- Journalists with up to five years' experience generally rise to around £25,000, while those with a decade's experience or more can expect around £35,000 to £40,000.




