VAPING

Dear Parents/Guardians

Some information regarding how students might be accessing vape devices has come to our attention which we would like to share with you so we all remain vigilant.

As you know vape devices are a banned item in our school but recently we have found the number of students in possession of them rise slightly. Although we will continue to address this in line with our behaviour policy we also have a duty of care to find out where students are getting these devices from and as such have been exploring this. We have discovered that some students are ordering them online to be posted to their home address. This reduces the need to produce proof of age as it relies on the postal workers requesting this which, apparently, is not always the case. We have also found that parents are not always aware of when this is happening. We ask that as we will remain vigilant in school that you also continue to do the same, especially if packages are being delivered to your home that you may not be aware of. You may also wish to be more vigilant in relation to online activity if you know your child is found at home with a vape device.

We will endeavour to keep you informed of any further information that we may receive and ask that you too keep us informed if you come across any information that concerns you. You can report this directly to admin@stonehenge.wilts.sch.uk.

BASKETBALL "WARRIORS BEATEN IN EPIC GAME"



BASKETBALL REPORT- "WARRIORS BEATEN IN EPIC GAME"

The Stonehenge School "Warriors" Basketball Team U16 Boys took on UK NBA Junior League opposition Trafalgar U16 Boys at Amesbury Sports Centre on Wednesday with about 100 Warriors supporters in fine voice. The team, sponsored by Stonehenge Plumbing and Heating, plan was to dominate defensively their opponents on every inch of the court, be consistent in finishing and be very aggressive in attack from the tip off.

An inform starting five of Kane Mia Ria, Joseph Vuki, Henry Sui, Chris Narruhn and Maks Kovalenko took to the court. The first period was a high scoring affair with Warriors dealing with a 6" 7 player who was faster, a better dribbler and finisher than any other Warrior players. It was a very physical affair with some Warriors players having to come off to recover from knocks. Kane Mia Ria scored well with Joseph Flynn and Joseph getting into the action with a first period score of 18-12 to the visitors.

In the second and third period coach Carter put Josh Mensah and Aaron Soulsby on Number 12 to double team him and stop his scoring, meaning that defensively it was 4 on 3 with the bench working hard to curtail the scoring of Trafalgar School. It worked well. However, our star player and scoring machine Henry Sui was really quiet offensively with some unlucky plays and shots rolling around the rim. Just not his day. His defence, crowd pleasing blocks and rebounds were outstanding though. In those 2 periods we also had great scoring again from "Captain Kane" with Xavier Lessey and Maks Kovalenko getting into the action. In fact, in Period 2 and 3 the Warriors outscored the visitors 15-11 to bring the score at the end of the 3rd period to 29-27 to the visitors. Exciting!

A very tense 4th Period started with Warriors dominating but the ball just wouldn't go in! Lay ups missed and shots rolling around the rim meant that the Warriors couldn't get the points they needed. Their effort and defence were outstanding with tired players putting in a maximum effort. Warriors couldn't break their defence enough and even with Kane Mia Ria scoring well, the Warriors fell short at the whistle, losing 37-33. A really good performance in parts but Warriors need to improve their attacking options, pass the ball quicker and be more consistent in finishing. Lots to work on. Warriors are next in action on Wednesday 1st March vs Wellington Academy at home. Ticket details coming out soon. I know some of the squad took the loss personally but remember what Michael Jordan (the greatest player of all time) said about his NBA career and life:

"I've missed more than 9000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. 26 times, I've been trusted to take the game winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed.

Thank you too for our amazing supporters and drummers that created an electric atmosphere. The coach of Trafalgar said "Thanks for hosting am glad your boys enjoyed it. It is safe to say that our boys did too, as they did not stop talking about the quite frankly amazing atmosphere that your students created yesterday, the whole way home. I must also add that those watching were incredibly positive and even came up to my players after the game to congratulate them and say how well they played. They are a real credit to your school.

TAX FREE CHILDCARE REMINDER FOR FAMILIES

HM Revenue and Customs are reminding families that they can save up to £2,000 a year on childcare costs with Tax-Free Childcare.

Tax-Free Childcare can help working families pay for any approved childcare for children aged 11 or under, or 16 if the child has a disability - whether the child goes to nursery, a childminder, attends breakfast or after school club, has holiday care or goes to an out-of-school activity.

For every £8 paid into an online account, families will automatically receive an additional £2 from the government. Parents can receive up to £500 every 3 months (£2,000 a year), or £1,000 (£4,000 a year) if their child is disabled.
