### PARENT/CARER TRAVEL SURVEY

We are looking to update our School Travel Plan in a bid to attempt to reduce the volume of cars accessing the school site and to create a more favourable environment for those walking and cycling to school. The Travel Pan also provides useful evidence for healthy schools' accreditation, and opens up funding possibilities, both for on-site related infrastructure and for highway improvements.

To support us in the development of this plan, we are asking all stakeholders to complete a travel survey so that we can collect information on how you travel to school and where you travel from. All of the information we collect from you will be included within our travel plan and will support us to apply for additional funding for a feasibility study into highway measures to improve the journey for those walking and cycling to school.



# BARCELONA

Early on Wednesday morning, before the sun was even considering rising, 25 slightly sleepy and very excited students from Years 9, 10, and 11 boarded a coach with Mr Vickery, Mrs Colvin and Mrs Blake, bound for Gatwick Airport to begin their trip to Barcelona. Having made it through the airport without issue, we boarded the aeroplane and made it to Catalonia's capital 30 minutes early. We disembarked into warm sunshine; no big coats needed there!

From the airport, we travelled into Barcelona itself on the efficient automated public transport. We dropped our bags at the hostel and immediately set about seeing some of the sights. We headed back on the Metro to Plaça de Catalunya, and then down Las Ramblas to the marina, where we were staggered by some of the superyachts moored there. After a bit more walking and soaking up the atmosphere, we headed back to the hostel ready for our dinner.

Thursday morning saw us travelling out to Parc Güell, which involved quite a steep climb. Parc Güell was originally designed as a conceptual housing estate by Gaudí, but with only two houses being completed, it is now a large park featuring many of his architectural idiosyncrasies. Having descended from the dizzy heights of Parc Güell, we headed back into the city to call to La Boqueria, which is a famous food market situated just off Las Ramblas. It was lovely to see so many of our students practising their Spanish as well as embracing the fresh Spanish fare on offer. Another trip on the Metro and another hill saw us head out to El Poble Espanyol, which is an architectural trip through the regions of Spain, featuring lots of different exhibitions and ateliers. There was a modern art exhibition there, which a number of students enjoyed and the staff really loved hearing their insights into some of the pieces.

Friday was another busy day for us. The students had some time to explore the Gothic Quarter and savour the architecture, the shops, and just the feel of being in Spain. From there we travelled out to the Arc de Triomf (designed to be the gateway to Barcelona's International Exhibition in the 19th Century), and then walked to the Sagrada Familia. The Sagrada Familia is the pinnacle of Gaudí's work in Barcelona. When it's completed (hopefully 2026) it will be the largest church in the world. It's impressive from the outside, but as we went on our tour it became clear that its real beauty lies inside. Arriving, as we did in the afternoon, the sun was streaming through the stained-glass windows. It was breathtakingly stunning.

Saturday morning saw some people heading to the Picasso museum, and some heading out to Barceloneta beach before heading back to the Airport to begin our journey home, where we arrived back in time to start half term!

On behalf of the staff, please can I, again, pass on our thanks to the exemplary behaviour, engagement and interest, demonstrated throughout this trip by the students. It was a genuine pleasure to accompany them on this trip.

One of our students, Charlie Pearson from Year 10, sums up his experiences of the trip thus: "Our visit to Barcelona was amazing. We went to a plethora of different landmarks, took lots of photos, and had a chance to utilise our Spanish knowledge in the real world.

My best memory of the visit was our trip to the Sagrada Familia. The stained windows allowed light to shimmer across the interior of the building, coupling with the impressive design to create an awe-inspiring atmosphere. It really gave me a chance to sit and admire the architecture.

I really enjoyed playing cards at the hotel whenever I had time. We delved into games such as Cheat and Gin Rummy, in some of which I came out as the winner.

I was exhausted by the end of the trip, but I enjoyed every single moment of it!"

### DORSET & WILTSHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE AUTHORITY

12-week consultation opens for proposed new Community Safety Plan

A 12-week consultation has been launched for Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Authority's proposed new Community Safety Plan.

The plan sets out the priorities and challenges for Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service from now until 2028, covering areas such as prevention, protection, response, governance and people.

Chief Fire Officer Ben Ansell said: "The plan details how we intend to continue working, but also what we intend to review and do differently to meet and reduce the risks we face as an organisation. Public sector finances are under extreme pressure, so it is vital that we look at all parts of the Service to ensure that we are working as efficiently and as effectively as possible."

The consultation runs from 9am on Friday 9 February until 9am on Friday 3 May. Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Authority will then consider the consultation responses and the final plan at its meeting in June.

Cllr Rebecca Knox, Chair of the Authority, said: "The Community Safety Plan is our 'roadmap' for the coming years, so the views of people from across our communities are essential. Whether you are a resident, a local business, a partner, a voluntary group or a charity, we would very much like to hear from you."

### STEM TRIP TO ST. JOHN'S MARLBOROUGH THURSDAY 22ND FEBRUARY 2024


Six year 8s went to a Faraday Competition day and joined in a competition against 5 other schools in Wiltshire. They met two engineers who work on submarines and one who fixed aircrafts. The day was sponsored by the REUS Jeffrey Road Fund which is a charity which funds research and projects to do with safer road transport for all which is sustainable. Our students planned and designed and made a prototype of a road with extra lanes for cyclists and walkers which had a barrier separating them from the cars lit by LEDs which came on at night. They had to demonstrate their model and explain their ideas to the audience and worked very well as a team.

The winning team was from The Wellington Academy which designed a model where a car stimulated a pressure sensor and turned on a light and buzzer on blind bends to warn oncoming traffic and pedestrians and other road users.

Our thanks go to Mrs Gulliver who drove the minibus through flood water and a squall to get us there and back.
