YEAR 10 TRIP TO THE GLOBE THEATRE

This Tuesday, 44 Year 10 students got the opportunity to visit the rebuilt Globe Theatre on the banks of the Thames. We visit every year, taking advantage of the Globe's season of special presentations for young people.

This year, the production was Romeo and Juliet, but with the play transposed to a modern-day urban setting,

emphasising the gang violence of the original. The students watched a gritty performance, with the Globe's traditional stage filled with graffiti, actors in hoodies, and the constant menacing threat of masked youths circling on bikes.

The performance pulled no punches (literally), with stage blood regularly having to be mopped up after each fight. The juxtaposition to the present day served to highlight the poignancy of Shakespeare's words and message, and serve as a reminder that not only could he write the strong female characters like Lady Macbeth and Beatrice that we study in school, but he was also pretty accurate in his depiction of self-obsessed love-struck teenage boys. Romeo's pitiful wailing clearly struck some chords in the audience.

In a play set firmly in the mobile phone era (with characters regularly filming fights and their aftermath) how did Romeo, exiled in a desolate post-industrial Mantua, not receive Friar Lawrence's vital message, you ask? The answer is that he had his phone snatched from his hand by a youth on a scooter, obviously.

Our students were impeccably behaved, and a credit to the school. Thanks too must go to Mrs Ward, Mr Lavers, Mrs Macbeth, and Miss Evans for giving up their time to accompany the trip. Here's to next year's performance of Julius Caesar In Space (I'm making this up).



MOMPESSON HOUSE

This year, Mompesson House is one of 18 National Trust sites across the whole country to receive funding for the Festival of Blossom. We've got some free activities for the community and some free with entry to the house.

From now until the 4th June, we've got free trails of the Cathedral Close (attached). These are designed to be inclusive to children with SEND and people with dementia, and we worked with the Sensory Trust to create these. They include 10 sensory activities themed around nature to do in the Cathedral Close and talking points to spark memories.

We've also got a lot of workshops and activities at Mompesson House. These culminate in a "Party in the Garden" for May half term, which will have free activities such as seed bomb making, flower crown making and rose petal perfume making as well as sensory play stations around the garden. There's more information about the events here, we have things on every week from now until June [Festival of Blossom] | [Wiltshire] | National Trust.
