This is a month dedicated to celebrating and understanding children and young people from services families. Being a service child comes with many challenges, such as coping with the deployment of a parent, to moving schools and having to make new friends. Here at The Stonehenge School we currently have 391

students identified as being from services families and we are situated near many military bases. We also have many staff associated with military services. With that in mind, it's important that our students understand that children and young people from services families sometimes face challenges which are unfamiliar to those who aren't from services families. In response to this, we invest heavily in our pastoral support team, ensuring there is a dedicated Pastoral Manager in each year group ready to support those students who may face some of these challenges. We've also been able to offer the opportunity for some services students to visit Bath Spa University, to discuss their experiences with others, and for them to come to us to work with Year 9 services students on their career aspirations. The fantastic charity, Little Troopers, has been used here within school to support students and give them the opportunity to share experiences.

This month, to celebrate The Month of the Military Child, the charity Never Such Innocence have launched a competition in celebration of children and young people from services backgrounds and we will be sharing this competition with students during tutor time sessions next week. The title of the competition is: 'Life as a Dandelion'. Did you know the official flower of the military child is the dandelion? Dandelions put down roots almost anywhere they grow, and it's almost impossible to destroy. It's a survivor in a broad range of climates. Military children bloom everywhere the wind carries them. They are hardy and upright. Their roots are strong, cultivated deeply in the culture of the military, planted swiftly and surely. They're ready to fly in the breezes that take them to new adventures, new lands, and new friends.

CHANGES TO ARRANGEMENTS FOR BRONZE AWARD

We have two excellent members of staff who are stepping in to support on a voluntary basis, Mrs Thompson and Mrs James. We have also secured the support of Wiltshire Council's outdoor education team, whom we have been working with to ensure the awards continue.

They have assessed what training the teams still require, as well as their own availability to run the expeditions, and unfortunately we are postponing both the practice and qualifying expedition for the Bronze award until Term 1 of the academic year 2024-2025 (September to October). Once I have new, confirmed dates for training (likely to be after school), practice and qualifying expeditions I will be in touch.

Students should continue with the other three sections of the award in the meantime: volunteering, physical and skills.

We understand that this postponement is disappointing news, but securing the support of this new team means that all students will still complete their Bronze award.

Medal for Writing Shortlist LIBRARY PREFECT BOOK REPORT Week One: Keiraleigh



The Door of No Return- Kwame Alexander

Synopsis

The story begins following our protagonist Kofi Offin through his life in the village of Upper Kwanta (or 'Upper' as the characters refer to it). Kofi Offin is content with his life of tradition; spending most of his time with his friend Ebo by the river or talking to Nani; listening to his ancient stories. The only character at this point with an outside influence being his English-loving teacher Mr. Goodluck Philip, who- though important to Kofi Offin, due to his enjoyment of Shakespeare- has his views overshadowed by the overall traditional community of the village. Kofi Offin begins to face some hardships in his family as a rivalry arises between him and his cousin whilst his brother Kwasi makes a grave mistake at their local festival. However, these challenges soon seem trivial as Kofi Offin is taken far away from the home he holds dear, meeting new friends as he discovers there may be no way to return.

My thoughts

I believe the unique writing style throughout this book was an excellent choice in keeping the reader engaged through some of the hard topics Kofi Offin faces throughout the story. It also succeeds in adding a sense that we are only to think at Kofi Offin's pace; allowing the reader to take in Upper (and the rest of Kofi Offin's world) at a slower pace. This later keeps the reader in suspense as Kofi Offin is taken and attempts to figure out why and what is going to happen down the line for him.

Audience

I think this book would be great for a teenage audience interested in learning more about the actuality of slavery for the people on a more personal level, rather than through the cut and dry facts given in history lessons. Although not a conventional read for me, it was interesting to branch out into a different kind of story.
