Stonehenge School vs Dorcan Academy

After a few weeks of anticipation, our excitement and nerves were at an all time high. The game was finally about to take place. We managed to get a coach to come with us with around 50 pupils accompanying us; it was great to have their support. We left school early in order to get into 'the zone' and have a great warm up. We got the feel of the pitch and were brimming with pre-match confidence, despite Toby Cooper and Jacob Adams playing through their injuries, both showing great courage and started the game at centre back.

Finally, the game was about to begin. After a great warm up, we were rocking and ready to go. We were told our line-up and given our tactics, we had a team talk and were hyped up. We then entered the pitch.



The game commenced and the fans were ecstatic and gave us more of a sense of urgency to win and bring the cup to Stonehenge for the first time in the school's history.

The team that were put out were very confident with their positions, as this was the squad they had played throughout the majority of the season. We have already had a great record this season and played some excellent football.

As the game kicked-off, Jacob Adams took a shot from the half-way line but nothing came from it. The first 10 minutes was a feisty battle from both sides trying to edge the lead. A good attack from Stonehenge occurred, with Jay Bulmer on the ball with a risky tackle against Jay and nothing coming from the advantage played, Stonehenge had a free-kick on the edge of the box.

Joshua Woodward towered over the ball about 25 yards out. He crossed a promising ball into the box with Harry Chandler attacking it with his head and putting Stonehenge into a well-deserved lead. The game continued and was still a very tight contest, with the Stonehenge backline being compact against a hungry Dorcan who were trying to damage Stonehenge's advantage.

With the game being very much end-to-end, Dorcan found themselves with an opportunity to have a counter attack against Stonehenge who didn't have too many men back. As the Dorcan player progressed towards the Stonehenge goal, Henry Williamson tactically fouled the player and put the attack to a halt, but he was punished and received a yellow card.

Another free-kick was given away by Joshua Woodward for handball and Dorcan had a free-kick in a shooting position. The Dorcan player stepped up and whipped the ball towards the far post, but a good save by Dylan Smith kept Stonehenge in the lead.

As the half was coming to a close, Dorcan were finding themselves with a lot of the ball and plenty of attacks. Dorcan caught Stonehenge out and found the ball in the back of the net. Stonehenge players were all disappointed to give away such a cheap goal after such a good half. The players and ref glanced over to Joe Giblin, the linesman and his flag was up for offside. The goal was disallowed and halftime came around.

The boys played an excellent half and had a lead to be proud of. No changes were made at half-time, and the boys were just 40 minutes away from making history.

The second half began and pressure was still being put on by both teams and chances were being created, but not taken. The first 10 minutes were pretty even, but as the half progressed, Dorcan began to take control and Stonehenge were defending for their lives. Dorcan were switching balls from side to side and trying to open up Stonehenge's defence, but the players stood firm and didn't let them past.

The game was getting closer and closer to an end and Dorcan were getting chances. The first of the chances came when Dorcan's striker was one on one with Dylan Smith. Stonehenge players' hearts dropped as he took his shot, but he dragged it wide and Stonehenge's lead remained intact. More and more chances came when Dorcan played the ball into the 6 yard box at the back post and the Dorcan player was all alone. The player took the shot in an open goal and everyone thought that surely it was going to be 1-1, but he missed the chance of the game and somehow Stonehenge still had a 1-0 lead.

Stonehenge replied with a bit of pressure of their own and Nathan Doherty opened up a bit of space and took the opportunity to dribble with the ball and take a shot. His strike was excellent and nearly ended up doubling our lead which would have sealed the game for them.

With not much time left, Stonehenge made some substitutions (Malick Dem, James White and Nathan Doherty) and were just trying to keep the ball in the corner in Dorcan's half and see out the game.

The game had only a few seconds left and Toby Cooper gave away a very silly foul on the edge of our box. All the spectators, players and coaches were silent in this intense moment of the game. Stonehenge could have just thrown away their hard work for 80 minutes in just 2 seconds. The Dorcan player stepped up to take the free-kick and he knew what great pressure was on him. He took his shot... but he skied it over the bar.

Stonehenge were seconds away from making history and after a long fought 80 minutes, the ref finally blew the final whistle and Stonehenge were county cup champions for the first time.

The fans were buzzing with the result and all of them ran onto the pitch with the players and subs. It was an electric feeling for all the people involved including our number 1 fan Mr Braddick and it was a very proud moment for all the players and teachers in participation.

The players gathered around to take a photo and then all the spectators got together to take a massive photo together. They all then got in a huddle and started singing and it we all felt close together as a school. This was easily the best way to end our last ever game for the Stonehenge school and definitely a moment all the players will remember for the rest of their lives.
