Staying safe near water this summer.

As the summer holidays approach and the weather warms up, we know many children and young people will be spending more time outdoors. While rivers, lakes, and other open water areas can seem like fun places to cool off, they can also be extremely dangerous. The Royal Life Saving Society has some important information around staying safe and below is some key things to be aware of and how to stay safe.

Key dangers of swimming in the river

- Cold Water Shock: Even on hot days, river water can be extremely cold. Sudden immersion can cause panic, gasping, and even heart failure.
- Strong Currents: Rivers often have hidden currents that can quickly sweep even strong swimmers away.
- Hidden Hazards: Rocks, rubbish, and underwater plants can trap or injure swimmers.
- No Lifeguards: Unlike swimming pools, rivers and lakes are not supervised. Help may not be available in an emergency.
- Water Quality: Open water can contain harmful bacteria or pollutants that can cause illness.

How to stay safe

- Never swim alone and always let someone know where you are.
- Stick to supervised areas like swimming pools or lifeguarded beaches.
- Avoid jumping into water from bridges or rocks you don't know what's underneath.
- Wear a life jacket if you're near or on the water, especially when boating or paddleboarding.
- Call 999 immediately if you see someone in trouble do not enter the water yourself.

The Stonehenge School have partnered with Wiltshire Library Service to promote and celebrate their Story Garden Summer Reading Challenge 2025



The Summer Reading Challenge is for children up to and including 12 years old to read six books (or the equivalent) over nine weeks of the summer - in return for various prizes. The free challenge will run in Wiltshire libraries from Saturday 5 July to Saturday 6 September. The first two weeks (5 to 19 July) will be for registration only; from Monday 21 July children can start to collect stickers (and continue to register). Children must be library members to take part – it's free and easy to join, for more information pop along to Amesbury Library or visit: wiltshire.gov.uk/libraries-join-the-library.

The 2025 theme is: Story Garden – Adventures in Nature and the Great Outdoors, which will inspire children to tap into a world of imagination through reading, exploring the magical connection between storytelling and nature. When registering children will receive their own Story Garden sticker booklet to record their reading and as they finish reading books – will receive stickers for each one read, plus a certificate a badge on completion.

Although the challenge is to read six books, there is flexibility in this number, especially for children who struggle with reading or read longer books. Children can read any books of their choice; they don't have to be linked to the theme and they can read/listen to eBooks and audiobooks as well. It's all free and can make a real difference to a child's motivation and enjoyment of reading. Books on the official 'Story Garden Book Collection' list are available to reserve and borrow for free from any Wiltshire library. The list includes a mix of fiction (picture books, early readers and middle grade titles), non-fiction, poetry and graphic novels, plus several dyslexia-friendly books.

Children can also visit summerreadingchallenge.org.uk, where they can use the Book Sorter to discover new books, find fun reading activities and active challenges, play games, watch videos and write book reviews.

For children who want a further challenge and those older than 11 we have the Story Adventurers' Club, a personal reading challenge where children set their own reading goals, the target to read 100 books. For children aged under 4, we have a fun family book sharing challenge called 'Story Sharers'.

For any Year 7 pupil who participates in this brilliant opportunity The Stonehenge School will reward their efforts and achievements. Pupils need to keep their booklet and certificates safe and bring them to their new English Teacher in September. Every pupil that participates will receive house points and edible goodies. Every participant will also be entered into a prize draw where 5 lucky pupils will win a book vending machine voucher!

Dear Parents/Carers/Guardians,

As your local Neighbourhood Policing Team, we want to offer some advice and guidance around knife crime, particularly with the summer holidays approaching, when young people may be spending more time out with friends and exploring their independence.

Sadly, the issue of children carrying knives is a reality across the UK – not just in large towns or cities. While Wiltshire remains statistically safer than many areas, we cannot ignore the risks and influences that may lead a young person to make dangerous choices.

We want to reassure you that Wiltshire Police works closely with a range of

partner agencies to prevent knife crime through education, early intervention, and, when necessary, enforcement. If a child is found in possession of a knife, we always consider the full context and use a combination of support and appropriate consequences, including prosecution if proportionate.

If you're concerned your child or someone you know might be carrying a knife, and it feels safe to have a conversation, we encourage you to talk with them. They may share reasons for their choices that can be addressed together.

Often, children say they carry knives for protection, under the false belief that "everyone else does." The truth is the vast majority of young people do not carry knives – and carrying one actually increases the risk of serious harm to the person carrying it.

A knife doesn't make you safer – it puts you in greater danger.

The reality is:

- Carrying a knife is illegal.
- It increases your risk of getting hurt.
- It can cause deep distress or danger to friends and family.
- Police have the legal power to stop and search individuals if they suspect someone is carrying a weapon.
 A conviction for carrying a knife can affect future opportunities, including going to college or university, or travelling abroad to countries like the U.S.
- If someone is killed, two lives are lost—the victim's and the person responsible.

If you're worried that your child or someone you know is at risk, support is available.

E-scooters & electric bikes - do you know the law?



E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988.

You therefore need to have:

A driving licenceInsuranceMOT and Tax

It is against the law to ride them on the roads/ pavements or in public spaces. This includes car parks and play parks. Legal electrically assisted pedal cycles can be ridden by people over 14 years old. To be compliant with the law:

- It must have pedals which you need to turn to propel it
- It should have a motor of 250 watts or less
- The electrical assist should cut out at 15.5 mph

If it doesn't meet these criteria, it is classed as a motor vehicle and needs a licence, insurance, MOT and tax to be ridden legally.

If you use an e-scooter or e-bike against the law, you run the risk of it being seized and destroyed. You may also be prosecuted.
