A Century of Antrobus House:

Honouring Heritage, Community and Service

This year marks the 100th anniversary of Antrobus House, Amesbury's most distinguished civic building and a much-loved landmark in the town. Built as a gift to the people of Amesbury by Lady Florence Antrobus, it stands as both a memorial to her son, Lieutenant Edmund Antrobus, and a symbol of community spirit that continues to thrive a century later.

To commemorate the milestone, a special service was held at St Mary and St Melor's Church on Friday last week, attended by local dignitaries, representatives of the Grenadier Guards, and



members of the Amesbury community. Senior prefects from The Stonehenge School, accompanied by Headteacher Mrs Carole Dean, took part in the service – and were able to enjoy the wonderful performance of the guards afterwards.

Remembering Lieutenant Edmund Antrobus.

Lt Edmund Antrobus served with the Grenadier Guards during the First World War and was tragically killed in action in 1918 at the age of 27. His mother, Lady Florence Antrobus, wished for a lasting memorial that would both honour his memory and benefit the people of Amesbury. Construction of the house began in 1923, and by 1925, Antrobus House had opened its doors as a place for education, gatherings, concerts, and social events – a living memorial that celebrated community rather than sorrow.

A Century of Community

Over the past hundred years, Antrobus House has remained at the heart of Amesbury life. From wartime meetings and town celebrations to weddings, concerts, and local festivals, it has welcomed generations of residents through its doors. The House continues to be run in accordance with Lady Antrobus's original wishes, overseen by trustees who ensure that it remains a space for the benefit and enjoyment of local people.

At the centenary service, the presence of the Grenadier Guards carried deep significance – a tribute not only to Lt Antrobus's own regiment but also to the enduring connection between military service, remembrance, and community life. Their attendance, alongside pupils and school leaders, symbolised the continuity of respect and gratitude across generations.

In a poignant twist of history, it was later discovered that Stonehenge School Head Girl, Abigail Sheather, has a remarkable family link to the Grenadier Guards. Her great-grandfather, Regimental Sergeant Major Sheather, served with the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards and was killed on the beaches of Dunkirk on 1st June 1940. He was one of only two RSMs in the history of the regiment to be killed in action. Buried in a military cemetery in Belgium, he was recently commemorated at the Battalion Sergeants' Mess in Aldershot, where a photograph, his medals, and his story were unveiled in the presence of Abigail and the wider Sheather family. This powerful connection added a deeply personal layer of meaning to the day, linking the sacrifices of the past with the young people carrying their legacy forward.

As Antrobus House enters its second century, its purpose remains as relevant as ever: to bring people together, celebrate shared values, and honour those whose sacrifices shaped the freedoms we enjoy today.

Notice of Public Consultation by Amesbury Town Council regarding a proposed public works loan for the

acquisition and refurbishment of Boscombe Down Sports Pitches



Amesbury Town Council is undertaking a consultation regarding a proposal to obtain a Public Works Loan Board loan to purchase and refurbish the Boscombe Down Sports Pitches site on Stockport The vision provide Road. to is much-needed additional sports and community facilities, which will add to the Town Council's portfolio. This already Pavilion and includes Centenary Park Sports Pitches and Bonnymead

Recreation Ground, which lease long-term to Amesbury Town Football Club. Demand has outstripped supply for playing pitches. New facilities will provide a lasting legacy for our growing community, whilst enhancing health and wellbeing opportunities.

Site survey and refurbishment

An initial site survey carried out by the Town Council along with independent condition surveys have highlighted work that is required in order to bring the Pavilion building back into use. There is damage to the roof and some internal damage to the root and some internat ceilings/walls as a result of neglect. This will be a priority to rectify ahead of any use. The site has an artificial pitch previously used for Hockey; this is unusable at present. The Town Council has been liaising with Wiltshire Council, Wiltshire Football Association, the Rugby

Union and Sport England about funding options for a new 3G pitch. The Wiltshire Council Playing Pitch Strategy identifies this area as being short in supply, with great demand for a 3G Pitch. The most likely funding for this is through the Football Foundation, who may provide 75% of the funding. A new pitch is estimated to cost up to £1million, the Town Council and any stakeholders will need to fund the remaining 25% need to fund the remaining 25%.



Background Information

The MOD is disposing of the site at a sale price of £400,000, this is based on current use and condition of the land and buildings. It has been the Town Council's intention for some years to acquire the site should it become available. In 2022 the Town Council nominated the site as an Asset of Community Value, this was approved by Wiltshire Council. The site is now ready for disposal and the Town Council has formally expressed its interest to purchase it. It is working with the DIO and has instructed solicitors to act on its behalf. There are costs to be considered for the refurbishment of the Pavilion, for which we are setting a purchase of £350,000. The Town Council is also looking at Football Foundation grants to fund a budget of £350,000, plus a contingency of £70,000. The Town Council is also looking at Football Foundation grants to fund a 75% contribution towards a new 3G pitch, the Town Council may have to fund up to £250,000 towards this. In total the Town Council will need approx. £1million to see this project come to fruition and provide that vision of a lasting legacy for community.

How will it be financed?

The Council is proposing a Public Works Loan to fund the purchase of the site, the refurbishment of the Pavilion, the 25% contribution for a new 3G pitch, plus other upgrades such as fencing, flood lighting and associated legal and other fees. The Town Council does not yet know the full cost of the refurbishment project, it is working with contractors to provide estimates. assesses however that a loan of £1million will be required, payable over a 10 year period. This is a fixed rate loan on EIP repayments, whereby the annual figure will reduce each year.

Whilst the Town Council has significant reserves, the majority of these are specifically earmarked/restricted for use

What is a Public Works Loan?

The Public Works Loan Board is a lending facility operated by the UK Debt facility operated by the UK Debt Management Office (DMO) on behalf of HM Treasury. It provides loans to local authorities and other bodies for capital projects from the National Loans Fund. Any application is scrutinised by the DMO to ensure prudent financial planning and project management which will provide the DMO with confidence that the loan amount is affordable without undue burden on the taxpayer.

The Precept for 2025/26 is £807,242, an average Band D household contributed £175.09 to the running of the Town Council assets and services.

If a loan of £1million is approved, based on a loan repayment of approx. £152,000 in the first year, the increase to the Precept in 2026/27 will be approx. £33

The Town Council is interested to hear from residents and interested parties such as sports clubs and community groups.

through legal agreements and therefore cannot be considered for this project. It will set aside a £70,000 contingency fund from a 2025/26 underspend.

The Band D property, that's 63p per week — this amount only covers the loan repayment. The Band D amount may change due to how the Tax Base is calculated by Wiltshire Council, which is calculated by Wiltshire Council, which is likely to be confirmed in November/ December. The Town Council is currently considering its 2026/27 budget and precept requirements. It will carefully consider the overall increase to the precept and ways to reduce the costs passed on the tax payer.




