Messsage from the Headteacher

This Week at Stonehenge

This week, our Year 9 pupils took part in the Blunt Truth workshops, a hard-hitting programme delivered in schools across Wiltshire by Wiltshire Police. These sessions are designed to give pupils a clear understanding of the risks and consequences of carrying knives. They cover the law, the life-changing impact on victims, families, and communities, as well as the myths surrounding knife crime. Through real-life stories and interactive discussions, pupils were challenged to reflect on the dangers and to think carefully about the choices they make. The aim of these workshops is to educate and empower young people to stay safe and make positive decisions about their futures.

All year groups also benefited from assemblies led by members of the Young Carers Youth Council. These assemblies highlighted the reality of being a young carer – someone under 18 who helps to care for a parent, sibling, or relative due to illness, disability, mental health needs, or substance misuse. Pupils learned about the responsibilities young carers often take on, such as household tasks, emotional support, or managing medication, and how these can sometimes affect their own wellbeing, education, and opportunities. Importantly, the assemblies also raised awareness of the wide range of support available locally through organisations such as Carer Support Wiltshire and Community First's Youth Action Wiltshire, who provide respite activities, advice, and opportunities for young carers to connect with others who understand their experiences.

Finally, many pupils will be receiving postcards home this week, after nominations from subject teachers and senior staff. These postcards celebrate pupils' hard work, achievements, and positive attitudes – a small but meaningful way to reflect back to pupils and families how well they are doing.


Students can sign up on the website using teacher code WID5-067S to access weekly Maths challenges. Students can also join in with exciting live online Maths sessions which commence this weekend.




National Cipher Challenge 2025 - University of Southampton


JOB OF THE WEEK
