Headteacher Carole Dean said:

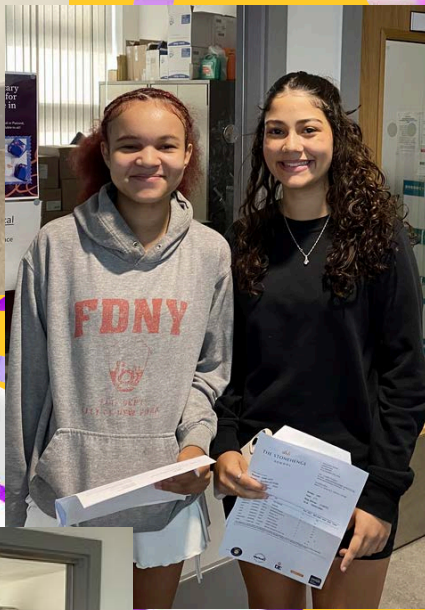
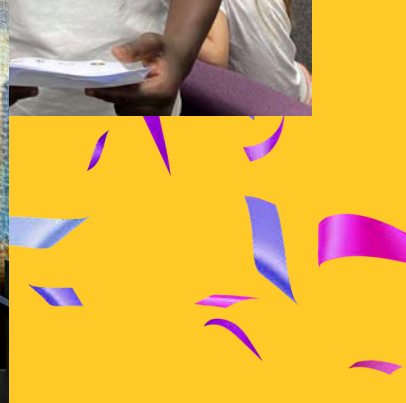

Welcome Back

It has been a pleasure to welcome pupils back for the start of the new academic year, and I would like to thank all parents and carers for the support you have shown in ensuring your child returned to school ready to learn - wearing the correct uniform, arriving punctually, and well-equipped for lessons. These high standards are an essential part of the school community we are building together, and your role in reinforcing them at home makes a real difference.

Assemblies and Settling-In

The week began with all pupils spending time with their tutors in a 'settling in' session - revisiting our core expectations and routines, and reminding themselves of the rewards and sanctions in place to support excellent behaviour and learning across the school. I also delivered an assembly to every year group, reflecting on our values and what it means to be part of The Stonehenge School community.

A key focus of this year's assembly was our core values of global citizenship and kindness. These are not just abstract ideas - they shape how we interact with each other, how we view the world, and how we contribute to it.

Global citizenship means recognising that we are all part of something bigger than ourselves. It's about understanding that our world is connected, and the choices we make - how we treat people, how we care for the environment, and how we stand up for what is right - reach far beyond our own school, town, or country.

A global citizen is someone who:

- Respects others - valuing people from every culture, religion, and background.
- Thinks beyond borders - recognising that challenges like climate change or poverty affect us all.
- Takes responsibility - understanding that our actions have consequences, both near and far.
- Shows kindness and fairness - standing against racism and injustice.
- Makes a difference - contributing positively, whether here in school, in our community, or across the world.

These are the values we seek to embed in our pupils every day, and I encourage you to talk to your child about how they can demonstrate them in their own actions.

Road Safety and Drop-Off Reminders

Finally, I want to draw your attention to an important safety message. This week, the AA published a stark reminder that over 6,000 children under the age of 16 were injured while walking or cycling on UK roads in 2023. With the start of term now underway, and with increased traffic around school sites, the AA is urging all drivers to take extra care.

As a school, we have consistently reminded parents and carers to avoid using the area directly outside the front of school to drop off or collect children. This area quickly becomes congested, creates dangerous blind spots, and increases the risk to pupils, particularly younger or more vulnerable ones.

The AA offers the following key safety advice for drivers:

Reduce speed in school zones - even where signs are not displayed

Avoid mobile phone use while driving

Do not park on zigzag lines or immediately outside school gates

Watch carefully for children crossing roads or on bikes/scooters

Always stop when requested by a school crossing patrol

We are proud to build on the legacy of Sure Start through our Best Start Family Hubs, a growing network of welcoming spaces. Families can access a wide range of support and services to make the journey of being a parent a little easier – from expert advice on feeding your baby to how to support your toddler's learning and development at home.

Of course, this is just the beginning. This government will keep building support for you and your family to help make parenting easier and ensure no child's background dictates what they go on to achieve. I know that this is also a priority for local MPs and councils, who can provide more information about what is available in your area. I encourage you to get in touch with them directly.
